Benedictine Sisters of Florida Name New Prioress

On May 9, 2010, after months of prayerful consideration, the Benedictine Sisters of Florida selected Sister Roberta Bailey, O.S.B. to serve as prioress of Holy Name Monastery for the next six years. She has been a member of the order for more than 50 years and has served as an elected member of the Benedictine Sisters Council. Her administrative roles at Holy Name Monastery have included community treasurer and chair of various committees including the 110th Anniversary, Benedictine Self-Study and Visitation, Election Discernment, chapel renovation and three terms as an elected chapter delegate to the Federation of Saint Scholastica. Sister Cecelia Dwyer, O.S.B., from Bristow, VA (election discernment facilitator) and Sister Esther Fangman, O.S.B. (Federation president) joined the community for the election weekend.

S. Roberta and the leadership team (Council) were installed at Morning Praise on June 30, 2010. Team members include: Subprioress S. Mary David Hydro, Appointed member S. Eileen Dunbar and elected councilors S. Mildred Gelis

and S. Jean Abbott (treasurer). At 10:30 a.m. that same day Bishop Robert Lynch celebrated a Mass of Thanksgiving for the community and their guests. The Bishop and guests joined the community for a buffet luncheon.

On Sunday afternoon, September 26, 2010, the community hosted an Open House and reception to introduce Sister Roberta to the local community. The community's oblates helped receive guests who were treated to a tour of the monastery and enjoyed homemade cookies as they visited with Sister-friends, or began new relationships with members of the Benedictine community.

Several months prior to the election weekend, in order to determine our direction for the next six years, the sisters committed themselves to three directional goals:

- We will grow together as a vibrant community by deepening our spirituality which will enable us to become more life-giving to others. [See the Family Night photo.]
- We will revive the ongoing formation program to include contemporary issues, topics related to the Benedictine Charism, and relational skills building.
- We will complete the planning process with Zielinski and Associates and implement agreed upon outcomes.

S. Roberta was born in Wilmington, DE and raised in New London, CN and DeLand, FL. She is a graduate of Holy Name Academy, a residential school formerly operated by the Benedictine Sisters of Florida in St. Leo. She received a BS degree in Elementary Education and Library Science from Bellarmine-Ursuline College in Louisville, KY, and earned a Montessori Preprimary Certificate from the Midwest Montessori Teacher Trainers Institute in Chicago. She completed her MA degree in elementary education with a specialization in early childhood education at the University of South Florida.

A respected educator throughout the state of Florida, S. Roberta was most recently principal of Saint Anthony Catholic School (in San Antonio, FL) for 15 years. Until her election she was on the board for the Pasco-Hernando Early Learning Coalition and is currently a member of the boards of directors for the Greater Dade City Chamber of Commerce, Sunrise Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Center and Saint Leo University. She serves on the board of the Florida Association for the Education of Young Children and is the association’s representative to the Southern Early Childhood Association. She was appointed by the governor to serve on Florida’s first Universal Pre-Kindergarten Advisory Committee. She served several terms on the diocesan council for Catholic Schools and Centers and was the first woman on the diocesan liturgy commission.

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S. Mary Dorothy Celebrates Jubilee of Profession

Sister Mary Dorothy Neuhofer, O.S.B. was among the honorees when Bishop Robert Lynch celebrated the annual jubilee Mass of Thanksgiving on October 23rd at St. Jude's Cathedral for sisters, brothers and religious order priests who celebrate their anniversaries of profession during this calendar year.

Sister Mary Dorothy Neuhofer was born in St. Joseph, Florida, the second child of Joseph P. Neuhofer and Helen Frances Barthle. She entered the Benedictine Sisters of Florida (in St. Leo) in 1949, professed her first vows in 1950 and made profession of perpetual vows in 1953. Sister's career began as an elementary school teacher in Catholic schools in Jacksonville, North Miami and Jacksonville, FL.

S. Mary Dorothy began working for Saint Leo University (then College) in 1965 as a Reference Librarian and Cataloger. Over the years, she has served as Director of Reader

Services, Head of Reference and Library Instruction Services, Assistant Director of Library Services, Library Director, and Archivist.

She earned her Ph.D. in Library Studies in 1998 from Florida State University, and she was promoted to the faculty rank of Full Professor in 2000. She has a number of publications, has made numerous presentations, holds membership in several professional organizations, and has served as editor for several publications. She has provided an enormous amount of community service to Saint Leo University, including but not limited to obtaining grant funding for the library, and serving on a number of committees, service to her profession, including president/past president of the American Benedictine Academy, service to the local community including membership on the Pasco County Historical Preservation Committee, and service to our community including serving as Prioress of the Holy Name Monastery.

Sisters Serve as Volunteers In Various Ministries

Sister Roberta continues to serve on the boards of the Dade City Chamber of Commerce, Saint Leo University, Sunrise Domestic Violence Shelter, Florida Association for the Education of Young Children and Southern Early Childhood Association, Moore Mickens Education Center, Sacred Heart Child Care Center and the Division of Teacher Education for Saint Leo University.

Sister Margaret Mary continues her membership in the West Pasco Legal Support Association. She is a Florida licensed paralegal and works in the office of Boyko & Griebel in New Port Richey.

Sister Donna continues her ministry as Mayor Pro Tem and Town Commissioner for the Town of Saint Leo.

Sister Jean continues to serve as community treasurer and to represent the Sisters of Holy Name Monastery at the East Pasco Ministerial Association, the Dade City Salvation Army Advisory Committee, the TAD (The American Dream) Advisory Committee, and the Pasco Coalition for the Homeless.

Sister Mary David continues her membership in Benedictines for Peace and the Benedictine Formation Conference.

Sisters Mary David and Dianne frequently conduct tours of the monastery for groups from Saint Leo University.

News Briefs: February – August 2010

Monastery guest Madeleine (“Maddie”) McNeil gave a concert for the sisters on February 5. She sang and played both a mountain dulcimer and a hammered dulcimer.

The monks of Saint Leo Abbey were guests at the monastery for Evening Praise and supper on Feb. 10, the Solemnity of Saint Scholastica. This is an annual tradition between the two communities.

Sister Germaine Bevans, O.S.B., died at 8:35 am on February 12, at the age of 75 with family and community members at her side.

Sister Mary Clare attended the Catholic Foundation Celebration honoring priests from the diocese and benefitting diocesan Tuition Assistance Initiative on Feb. 20

Sister Eileen was selected to participate in the 2010 Leadership Saint Leo program at Saint Leo University. A reception honoring Sister Roberta, who was resigning from her job as principal of St. Anthony Schools to become prioress at Holy Name, was held at the Saint Anthony Parish Center June 8.

A one-day Diabetic Camp was held at the Lake House on June 13. The event was sponsored by the (monastery) Lake House Tang Soo Do Martial Arts School which is owned and operated by Morgan and Joan Becker.

The Sisters are grateful for the 99 years of faithful spiritual ministry by the monks of St. Leo Abbey and we look forward to a continued relationship with our "Brother-monks".

The sisters enjoyed a meal at Kafe Kokopelli as the guests of owners Glen and Gail Greenfelder on July 29. The meal was in honor of Sister Germaine.

Father Stephan Brown took Sisters Helen, Eileen, Margaret Mary and Volunteer Jo Shine for a "field trip" to the Florida Winery on State Route 52 for a wine tasting on July 31.

The annual community retreat took place August 1-6. Retreat director this year was Dr. Victor Kramer. The topic of the retreat was the writings of Thomas Merton.

Excerpts from The Benedictine Sisters of Florida: Memories of the First Hundred Years

Compiled in commemoration of the 100th anniversary (1989) by S. Mary Jerome Leavy, O.S.B., 1889

INTRODUCTION: The following (book) is a collection of stories reflecting the first hundred years (of the Benedictine Sisters of Florida) as a community at Holy Name. They are elements shaping our collective memory and culture. Some are of events remembered by “everyone” who was there; others are stories of events remembered by only one person now alive. The purpose of the collecting and recording of the stories is to affirm the collective memory, to preserve what we might otherwise lose over time, to celebrate the richness of our heritage and ourselves. A further purpose is to mark our 100 years of life with a reflection on our memory which, like our community itself, is alive and growing.

The memory of the group includes both joy and sorrow, gain and loss, great moments and the daily recurring events. An effort has been made by all of us to remember and record what has shaped us and helped us to become sisters of one mind living together.

These stories have been collected over the years from “everyone.” No claim is made for factual verification. These are our memories, not necessarily our history. Much has been forgotten; much has been lost in the translation; some has been lost in the fervor of periodic housecleaning – but that is one of the stories.

CHAPTER ONE: GETTING THERE/HERE

None of us now alive has a first-hand experience of the beginnings but our “first story” contains the seeds of many of our subsequent adventures in Benedictine living. The one page formal record that we have of the first months of our common life says simply:

Holy Name Academy, San Antonio, Florida

In the month of December 1888 Rev. F. Gerard, O.S.B. petitioned M. Dolorosa Scanlon Superior of Sacred Heart Convent, Fulton St., Allegheny City, Pa. to take charge of his schools.

In compliance with this petition M. Dolorosa (Scanlon), Sisters Boniface Feldmann, Josephine Felding, Agatha Giesler, with the full consent of their General Superior Ven. Mother Aldegunda Feldmann, the Rt. Rev. Bishop Phelan of Pittsburgh, Pa., Spiritual Director and confessor, undertook the work of the foundation in the State of Florida, Diocese of St. Augustine under the Rt. Rev. Bishop Moore, D.D. Independent house with its own novitiate. M. Dolorosa being elected Superior the sisters assumed the great work, March 1st 1889. And ere long God sent help. May 1st Miss Ada M. Scanlon entered. The first candidate for the South. June 24th, 1889, Ven. Sr. M Agnes Behe joined the community.

“Like a Sunflower” 2010 Federation Chapter Meeting

Sister Ephrem Hollerman, from St. Benedict Monastery, St. Joseph, MN, was the key-note speaker. Sunflowers (from CA) decorated the meeting room and prayer space. Carey Landry’s “Like a Sunflower” and the sunflowers, turning their faces toward the source of light, served to keep focus on the theme for the week. A special treat was a performance by Micronesian native dancers from Liberty, MO. where some of them have relatives who are Benedictine Sisters.
